

## Remembering Hurricane Hazel 60 Years Later

Hazel was the fourth major hurricane of 1954. It formed on October 5th near the island of Grenada in the southern Caribbean. The storm was originally expected to take a northeasterly track but instead raced northward. It spanned the distance from the Carolina coastline to Ontario in just 12 hours. Instead of dissipating, the storm merged with a cold front and re-intensified unexpectedly and rapidly. On October 15, 1954, Hazel struck Southern Ontario. The storm pounded the Toronto region with winds that reached 110 kilometres per hour (68 mph) and rainfall up to 285 millimetres (11.23 inches) in 48 hours. Despite all of the historic blizzards, floods, ice storms and tornado outbreaks, Hurricane Hazel is still remembered as Canada's "storm of the century."


